Sunday Scriptures: 5/11

Reflection for Sunday, May 11, 2025



Mother's Day - Matrimony protects, strengthens, and empowers motherhood. Modern culture minimizes both marriage and motherhood. The Sacrament of Matrimony is a powerhouse of grace that can be experienced in daily words and acts of love between husbands and wives – and though them to their children. When a husband's actions say "I DO!" daily to his wife, the woman can respond in an outpouring of Matrimonial Grace that blesses their children and everyone in their family and community!

First Reading

Acts 13:14, 43-52

Responsorial Psalm

Psalm 100 "We belong to the Lord."

Second Reading

Revelation 7:9, 14B-17

Gospel

John 10:27-30:

First Reading: Paul and Barnabas in Antioch

In this passage, Paul and Barnabas boldly proclaim the word of God despite opposition, finding joy in sharing the message with those who receive it. In marriages and motherhood, this reflects the commitment to stand together in faith, speaking truth in love – even when faced with challenges. A couple's shared partnership in their mission to live out their faith can inspire others, just as Paul and Barnabas did, trusting that God's grace will guide them through trials. Mother's Day is a great opportunity for husbands and fathers to reflect on how you and your spouse can encourage each other to persevere in sharing love and kindness, even when the world pushes back.

Responsorial Psalm: We Belong to the Lord

Psalm 100 celebrates belonging to God, joyfully serving Him as His people. In marriage, this reminds couples that their union is rooted in divine love, belonging not only to each other but to the Lord. This shared identity calls couples to approach marriage with gratitude and praise, serving one another with humility and joy. Consider how you can cultivate a home filled with thanksgiving, where your love reflects the goodness of the God to whom you both belong.

Second Reading: Vision of the Multitude

This vision of a multitude united in worship, cleansed and led by the Lamb, speaks to the eternal hope of God's kingdom. In marriage, it inspires couples to see their relationship as part of a greater tapestry, where love transcends differences and trials. The promise of God wiping away every tear encourages spouses to comfort and support each other through hardships, trusting in the eternal love that binds them. Reflect on how marriage can be a witness of unity and hope. Married couples are a living sacrament that invites and leads others to God's eternal promise of love.

Gospel - The Good Shepherd's Promise

Jesus, the Good Shepherd, knows His sheep and promises them eternal life, assuring them that no one can snatch them from His hand. In marriage, this reflects the deep intimacy and security of a relationship grounded in Christ's love. Just as Jesus knows and protects His flock, spouses are called to know and cherish each other, and their children, deeply, offering unwavering commitment and care. Consider how you can listen to your spouse's heart as Christ listens to His sheep, fostering a family bond that reflects His eternal, unbreakable love.

Sunday Scripture 5/25

Reflection for Sunday \overline{M} ay 25, 2025



Married couples are called to discern together like the early Church, radiate God's blessings like the psalmist, build on the eternal foundation of God's covenant, keep Christ's word, and embrace His peace. In doing so, couples can make their marriages a powerful sign of hope and grace -- living witnesses of God's love, peace, and glory. Marriage is not just a private bond but a sacramental mission to reflect Christ's love to the world.

First Reading

Acts 15: 1-2, 22-29

Responsorial Psalm

Psalms 67:2-3, 5, 6, 8 "O God, let all the nations praise you!"

Second Reading

Revelation 21: 10-14, 22-23

Gospel

John 14: 23-29

First Reading: Unity and discernment for the sake of love.

This passage describes the early Church resolving disputes through prayer, dialogue, and guidance from the Holy Spirit, choosing a path that fosters unity rather than division. In marriage, couples are called to be a domestic church, navigating disagreements and challenges with mutual respect and discernment. Just as the apostles sought what was essential for the community's good, couples are invited to discern together what builds their shared life, avoiding unnecessary burdens and focusing on love, forgiveness, and shared mission.

Practical Application: Pray together when facing decisions or conflicts, asking the Holy Spirit for guidance.

Second Reading: The jubilant city of God, radiates His glory

This vision of the New Jerusalem, where God's glory is the source of light, reminds couples that their marriage is a foretaste of heaven. Your love, rooted in Christ, reflects His eternal light, illuminating your home and community. The "foundation stones" of the city symbolize the strength and permanence of God's covenant, mirrored in the lifelong commitment of marriage. By centering your relationship on God, your marriage becomes a sacred space where His glory shines.

Gospel: Jesus' gift of peace and the promise of the Holy Spirit.

Jesus promises His peace, distinct from worldly peace, and the Holy Spirit to guide and strengthen His disciples. In marriage, this peace is a gift that sustains couples through trials, uncertainties, and daily stresses. The Holy Spirit empowers you to love beyond your human limits, to forgive when it's hard, and to remain faithful in all circumstances. By trusting in Jesus' presence and leaning on the Spirit, your marriage becomes a sanctuary of peace that reflects His love to the world.

Practical Application: When conflicts arise, pause to pray for peace and invite the Holy Spirit into the moment. Practice small acts of peace-making, like apologizing first or offering a kind word.

01

Married Couples

That married couples and families pray together and invite the Holy Spirit into the moment when facing decisions or conflicts, and seek God's guidance and reconciliation to see them through each trial.

02

Youth Vocations to Marriage

That young people anchor their lives on the "foundation stones" of God's strength and permanence, choosing the lifelong commitment of marriage. That they will center their relationships on God, with marriages that become a sacred space where His glory shines.

03

Parenting Holy Families

That parents find courage and strength through Sacramental living to intentionally choose God, prayer, and family as the first priorities among all the activities that demand their time and attention.

Jubilant Marriages May Spotlight Couple: Jennifer & Jim Meehan

How did you meet and know he/she was the one?

We met when we were both working at Anheuser-Busch: Jen in New Jersey and Jim in St. Louis. Jen came to "Headquarters" for a training class and Jim offered to take her to lunch. Lunch went so well that he invited her to dinner that night, and again the next night. Fast forward 27 years, we have 3 young adult kids, an aging cat, and are celebrating our 25th wedding anniversary in September.

What is one of the hardest things you had to live through and what got you through it?

Our second child, Meghan, needed multiple surgeries in the first few years of her life. We became very familiar with Children's Hospital. We spent our 5th wedding anniversary evening in the OR waiting room after her second emergency surgery. As we waited alone, holding hands and praying that our daughter would be ok, Jen noted that this was not the most romantic way to celebrate five years of marriage. Jim pointed out that this was what marriage was all about... Being together in the hard times, not just the easy ones. We got through that season by leaning on each other and on our faith. This month, we will watch Meghan graduate college with honors!

Where is God in your life, and in your marriage?

God is the most important relationship that either of us has. We both start our days with private prayer and we try our best to end each day with couple prayer. We did not start out our marriage with God at the center and it showed. As our family grew, we began to get involved in our parish. The more involved we got, the more important our faith became to us, and the more central Christ became to our marriage. In May of 2009, we renewed our wedding vows after Saturday Vigil Mass. From that point onward, Christ became a partner in our marriage. These days, when we have a difficult decision to make, we always begin by praying together and separately and sharing what we are hearing in prayer. Our involvement in a Marriage & More couple's small group helps keep us grounded and energized also.

What is your favorite way to make your spouse smile?

Jim: I can make Jen smile by reminding her of some of our "inside" jokes... We have a lot of them. I have to be careful, though, because if she starts laughing while she's driving, it can be treacherous. **Jen:** I'm pretty goofy... Dancing or singing or just being silly will always get a smile on Jim's face.

Vicarate Work/Side-by-Side Matrimony Mentor Training: Jennifer serves as the Director of Pastoral Ministry for the Southern Vicariate of the Archdiocese of St. Louis In this role, she provides support and assistance to parishes, staff, and volunteers in all areas of faith formation, catechesis, and evangelization. Recently, she developed a Matrimony Mentor Couple program, "Side-by-Side," which pairs more experienced married couples with engaged or newlywed couples for marriage preparation and accompaniment through their first wedding anniversary.



Ideas for Parents & Educators



In May, we reflect on the way each marriage can be a daily lived Sacrament of Faith, Hope and Love.

Holy Matrimony Role Models: Louis and Zélie Martin

Louis and Zélie Martin, the parents of St. Thérèse of Lisieux and the first married couple canonized together in 2015, exemplified marriage as a daily lived sacrament through their profound love for God and each other, their commitment to raising their children in faith, and their resilience in facing life's joys and sorrows. Their lives demonstrate how the Sacrament of Matrimony is not a one-time event but a continuous outpouring of grace that sanctifies spouses and radiates to their family and community. They embraced the sacramental grace of Matrimony to grow in holiness, sanctify their family, and serve others, proving that marriage is a path to sainthood.



For LITTLES

Invite little children to affirm the value of their parent's marriage:

- Give mommy and daddy a "three of us together hug" each day
- Write a surprise note: "I love you both- together!" and hide it in their bed.
- Do little things in a loving way like St. Therese did for her parents and family.
- Invite mommy and daddy to pray with the family all together for their marriage and for the family.



For MIDDLES

The Martins' marriage was not inward-focused but reached out to others. They were known for their charity, welcoming the poor to their table, and supporting local families. Zélie and Louis were active in their parish, including the St. Vincent de Paul Society. Their ordinary married life became extraordinary through Matrimonial grace.

Invite big kids to brainstorm with mom and dad how their family might do acts of service in the parish or for poor or shut-ins in their community, perhaps through the St. Vincent De Paul Society like



For TEENS

The Martins demonstrated resilience through suffering. They faced significant trials —Zélie's breast cancer, the deaths of four children, financial pressures, and the mental illness of Zélie's brother. Yet, they bore these crosses with faith, trusting in God's providence. Their fidelity in suffering showed that marriage is a sacrament of grace that sustains couples through life's hardships.

Invite teens to turn to prayer and the sacraments, especially the Eucharist, to find strength. Louis visited the Blessed Sacrament daily, and Zélie relied on Confession to renew her resolve.


