Sunday Scriptures: 8/10

Reflection for Sunday, August 10, 2025



The readings for the 19th Sunday of Ordinary Time contain key themes in the lives of all Christians and married couples – faith, hope, trust, awareness, and generosity. These are great touchpoints also for parents to embrace their role as "disciples making disciples" with their children.

These Scripture reflections are the fruit of reflections by Allen and Marian Love, and their 54 years of marriage. Allen is a Permanent Deacon. Marian is a Spiritual Director, gives days of reflection and is an adjunct instructor at Aquinas Institute. The Loves are members of Sacred Heart Parish in Valley Park.

First Reading

Wisdom 18: 6-9

Responsorial Psalm

First Reading - Trust the Future to God

The Israelites knew God had chosen them when they took the risk to flee their oppression in Egypt and they placed their trust in God's promises. We are all faced with difficulties and challenges at times in our lives. The reading reminds us to remember God's past action in our lives and trust that God will continue to guide us in the present and future. Married couples can face various difficulties in their relationship, especially in raising children. At such times couples can benefit from: 1) spending time recalling how God has journeyed with them over the years and place their trust in God's continued presence in their relationship going forward and 2) sharing that confidence with their children.

Second Reading - Trusting the Journey to God

Abraham did not understand God's call to leave his homeland and travel to a foreign country but he placed his faith and trust in God. Husbands and wives may have many dreams and many plans for how they want their careers, marriages, and family life to play out. Along the way, however, challenging opportunities or difficulties can present themselves. One or both spouses may have to make sacrifices, for the sake of the family. Confusion fear and doubt can shake a marriage when serious challenges arise. Life-threatening illnesses, disabilities, or behavior problems can be overwhelming for parents. Together, in prayer, couples can place their trust in God, like Abraham and Sarah, and move forward in faith with the strength they need, and at the same time set a powerful example for their children.

Gospel - Kingdom Living

Jesus tells his disciples that there is no need for fear for "God is pleased to give you the kingdom." God invites us to build the kingdom on earth by living a "kingdom" life of sharing our lives and resources with others. We know if we are living a kingdom life by looking at what is most important to us. "For where your treasure is, there also will your heart be." In married life, couples who live God-centered lives put their marriage relationship first, and find greater strength for all their other relationships. The ever-present graces of the marriage sacrament gives them the wisdom and courage needed to make the most loving choices in their role as "disciple makers" to their children, extended family, friends, and acquaintances.

Sunday Scripture 8/24

Reflection for Sunday August 24, 2025



The readings for the 21st Sunday of Ordinary Time remind us that we do not make our discipleship journey alone. Our family and parish community relationships help form us and can deepen our relationship with Christ. Married couples are encouraged to get equipped as disciple-makers in their families through enrichment opportunities such as Marriage Encounter and other marriage enrichment retreats and programming recommended through the Jubilant Marriages Initiative.

First Reading - Signs of God's Glory in People from Every Nation

The scene in the first reading is a great gathering of people from every nation. Gathered by God, God's glory will be revealed to them. They will become a living sign of God's presence to all the nations. We are all responsible for being living signs of God's glory through lives that embody forgiveness, compassion and love. In a particular way, married couples live out this mission by being witnesses of God's love in their love for each other and through their family and children. The grace of the sacrament of marriage makes God's love visible and tangible in the world.

Second Reading - The Blessings of Discipline

In the second reading, the author uses the word 'discipline' which often evokes the notion of punishment. The Greek word translated as 'discipline' actually refers to the process of teaching and formation. This is a more accurate way to understand discipleship. The passage encourages the hearers to regard the hardships and sufferings of life as teachable moments that open their eyes to new possibilities for growth. Each of us can acquire wisdom and confidence in God as we move through life. Married husbands and wives are in a unique position to remind one another, particularly in challenging times, that God has been and is with them in all situations. Each experience forms them and continues to prepare them for what lies ahead in their family and with their children.

Gospel - The Shared Journey of Salvation

In the gospel, someone from the crowd gathered to hear Jesus asks him, "Lord, will only a few people be saved?" Jesus' reply, "Strive to enter through the narrow gate" rejects the exclusivity implied in the question. The kingdom of God exists beyond simple membership in a particular group or church. Our faith is rooted in a person – Jesus the Christ. Discipleship with Jesus calls us to relationship. Our prayer, worship, sacraments and community of believers are all here to help us grow in our relationship with Christ. Marriage and family, like all meaningful relationships, requires effort. There are no shortcuts. There are no points in time to sit back on autopilot. Married couples are encouraged not to take their relationships for granted or minimize the value of those who love and support them.


From Kay: Why do I thank God for my husband, Paul?

Paul: Why do I Thank God for my marriage?

Kay: Why do I Thank God for my marriage?

I thank God for our marriage because it is truly God who brought us together. We knew each other from a prayer group years ago. Paul and I were friends long before we dated. We have been able to instill in our children their deep Catholic roots, teaching them their dignity as children of God given to them at Baptism. I see our marriage as an example of offering Mercy when needed and still choosing love everyday. I thank God for our marriage because I believe all of our years together -- raising children, appreciating victories, losing jobs, grieving miscarriages and deaths of parents and grandparents, celebrating weddings and births, and... just living in the trenches of raising children -- have brought us to this point in our lives where we can help support and encourage other young families to build their families as domestic churches with joy and resilience.



This loving married couple's family was like a team of adventurers -- learning, praying, and helping others -- on the path to heaven. What made Luigi and Maria so wise? They listened to God with their whole hearts. Every day, they went to church and fed their souls with Jesus in the Eucharist. They also prayed the Rosary as a family together each night, asking Mary, Jesus' mom, to guide them. Luigi and Maria also showed wisdom by helping others during tough times. During a time of war, they turned their home into a secret hideout for people who needed safety. They taught their kids to be brave and kind, and two of their sons became priests and one daughter became a nun, wisely helping others, just like their parents did.

For LITTLES

Invite little children to discover the virtue of WISDOM

- Talk about what it means to be wise -- Using what we KNOW to DO what is right.
- Think of times when someone made a wise choice and talk it over...what made it wise?

For MIDDLES

Maria and Luigi prayed the Rosary as a family each evening. Wise choices often flow from our hearts when we are spiritually strong. Try to pray a Rosary, or even start with one decade, a day - to ask for wisdom in making both small and big choices for a week.

Perhaps pray a World Mission Rosary and pray for people all over the world to become spiritually wise, healthy, and strong!
