Sunday Scriptures: 7/6

Reflection for Sunday, July 6, 2025



The readings for the 14th Sunday of Ordinary Time call us to rejoice in the wondrous works of God in our world and in our lives. In baptism, all are called to live lives of discipleship in gratitude and confidence in God. Like the seventy two in the Gospel who were sent out in pairs, married couples are called to live out their discipleship together gaining support from each other.

These meditations are the fruit of reflections by Allen and Marian Love, and their 54 years of marriage. First Reading

Isaiah 66: 10-14c

Responsorial Psalm

Psalm 66:1-7, 16, 20

Second Reading

Galatians 6: 14 - 18

Gospel

Luke 10: 1-12, 17-20

First Reading and Responsorial Psalm - Gratitude for Divine Grace

Our first reading and the responsorial psalm, invites us to notice the power and abundance of divine graces in our lives. Recognizing God's blessings leads us to gratitude and joy. Married couples who practice and share gratitude for God's blessings eventually come to recognize God's abundance and power in each other and those we encounter. We recognize God at work in the lives of others and they likewise can see God at work in the lives of the married couple. Gratitude multiplies - relationships flourish.

Second Reading - Life-Giving Wounds

In the second reading, Paul writes of the persecution and suffering that he has endured as a follower of Christ. These "marks of Jesus" do not cripple him but only make him stronger so that he can now "boast" only in the cross of Christ. The lives of all followers of Christ, at times, will include challenges, difficulties and suffering. Like Paul, all disciples of Jesus are called to hold on to the "new creation" that is emerging in their midst. Married couples who see the works of God in their lives and support each other in the good times can draw on the graces received and be assured that in times of difficulty and suffering God is also at work, creating something new and life-giving in their relationship.

Gospel - Embodying the Presence of Christ

In the Gospel, Jesus sends his disciples out in pairs "to every town and place he intended to visit." There is a sense of urgency in their mission so they are to reorder their priorities to those things that support and do not hinder the mission. The mission of the disciples is to carry the presence of Jesus with them to everyone they encounter. Baptism calls all Christians to share the presence of Christ in their daily lives. The grace married couples receive in the sacrament of marriage empowers them in a particular way to embody Christ's presence to their spouse and families and those they encounter. Family life can be hectic and complex with jobs, school and the outside activities of children, caring for elderly parents and other family obligations. Married couples must ensure that they make time for each other and their own prayer and spiritual life.

Sunday Scripture 7/20

Reflection for Sunday July 20, 2025



Mother Teresa placed the words "I Thirst" in every chapel of the Missionaries of Charity throughout the world. These words are to be a reminder to the sisters (and all of us) of Jesus' I Thirst on the cross. These words remind the sisters of their purpose to quench the thirst of Jesus for love, kindness, compassion and intimate relationship with all of us. We are all called to quench the thirst of Jesus in our daily lives. Married couples are called to live this out in a particular way in their relationship with their spouse and children.

First Reading: Generosity

In the first reading, the Lord in the disguise of three mysterious strangers visits Abraham and Sarah. In accordance with the custom of his day where visitors were to be welcomed with food and drink, Abraham and Sarah provided a lavish meal for the three strangers. The meal provided to the three strangers by Abraham and Sarah went beyond the cultural requirements for welcoming strangers – three measures of flour (40 to 60 pounds and a "choice" steer 400+ pounds). Their generous welcoming and intimate encounter with the visitors resulted in a promise from God that they would soon have a long awaited son. Married couples who live a life of gratitude for their spouse become more generous with their time, resources and their service to their family and others.

Gospel: Attentiveness

In the Gospel, Martha welcomed Jesus and seemingly went a bit overboard in preparing a meal for Jesus. When Martha asks Jesus to make her sister help out, Jesus replies, "Martha, Martha you are anxious and worried about many things. There is only one thing. Mary has chosen the better part." Jesus is not saying Mary's attentiveness is better than Martha's service, but rather both are important at particular times. Mary seemingly tunes into what Jesus needs at this time. Tired and exhausted Jesus 'thirsts' for their friendship, love, and support to bolster him for his final trip to Jerusalem. Daily life brings a myriad of to-do's with sometimes not enough hours in the day. In the midst of busyness, married couples can miss opportunities to make a connection with each other's deeper needs. Anxiety waiting for a test result, sadness over the loss of a friend, pressure from a difficult day at work, fatigue after a day of service to others are cues that a spouse 'thirsts' for focused attention more than the next thing on the list. Pausing, noticing, checking in with each other is key to building a deeper relationship in marriage or with any other person.

Just as spouses thirst for time and attentiveness form each other, Jesus 'thirsts' for our love and attention as key to nourishing and supporting our relationships and the service each of us are called to give. He invites us to regular prayer individually and for married couples, to seek ways to deepen our relationship with him together.

I thank God that our marriage vocation is our path to heaven, together.



Holy Matrimony Role Models: Pierre and Juliette Toussant

This holy couple were both born into slavery in Haiti and later settled in freedom in New York. They were profoundly generous with their time, resources, love and laughter. They raised their orphan niece as their own child. They persevered through many difficult trials. What sustained them? Their Catholic faith, joy and surprisingly...laughter.

For LITTLES



Invite little children to discover the virtue of JOYFULNESS.

- Pass laughter around in a circle. One person starts laughing (on purpose) and giggling and pass it on. Keep it going! Joy is contagious.
- Ask mommy or daddy to show you their "happy dance". Show them yours.
- Take photos with the family. Smile really big and say "JESUS!" instead of "cheese".

For MIDDLES



Pierre and Juliette overcame enormous difficulties, and yet while they were still not living on "easy street," they shared a married life together full of generosity and joy. Have children discuss the following story.

On one occasion, Pierre discovered that an affluent man he was acquainted with had been reduced to material poverty. The man, sick and suffering, craved a delicacy of food that he had formerly enjoyed and grown accustomed to, but now had no financial means to obtain it for himself. For several months Toussaint and Juliette sent his dinner, nicely cooked, in such a way that he could not suspect from whom it came. "If he had known,' said Toussaint, 'he might not have liked it; he might have been proud."" Juliette further recounted that when Pierre went to see him periodically, the man would brag about his prestige, his good friends, and how every day somebody sends him a nice dinner cooked by a French cook. Sometimes the man would even describe the various food items one by one. My good husband would come home, and tell me, and we would laugh very much."
